Welding Chucks are necessary for rotatory welding operations which is why they are usually attached to welding positioners, welding turntables, welding manipulators, and head and tailstock positioners. A 2-axis welding positioner will employ a 2 jaw Welding Chuck, whereas, a 3-axis welding positioner will employ a 3 jaw Welding Chuck and so on.
